## BUREAU OF AUTOMOTIVE REPAIR ORDER OF ADOPTION

§ 3395. Criteria for Rehabilitation.

(a) When considering the denial, <u>suspension</u>, <u>or revocation</u> of a license or a registration under Section 480 <u>or 490</u> of the Business and Professions Code <u>on the ground that the</u> <u>applicant</u>, licensee, <u>or registrant has been convicted of a crime</u>, the Bureau shall find that the applicant, licensee, <u>or registrant made a showing of rehabilitation if the</u> <u>applicant</u>, licensee, <u>or registrant completed the criminal sentence at issue without a</u> <u>violation of parole or probation</u>., the bureau, in evaluating the rehabilitation of the <del>applicant</del>, will consider the following criteria

(b) If the applicant has not completed the criminal sentence at issue without a violation of parole or probation, the denial is based on professional misconduct, the suspension or revocation is based on a disciplinary action as described in Section 141 of the Code, or the denial, suspension, or revocation is based on one or more grounds specified in Sections 9884.7, 9884.22, 9889.2, 9889.3, or 9889.4 of the Business and Professions Code, the Bureau shall apply the following criteria in evaluating an applicant's, licensee's, or registrant's rehabilitation:

(1) The nature and severity gravity of the act(s), professional misconduct, or crime(s) under consideration as grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation-:

(2) Evidence of any act(s), professional misconduct, or crime(s) committed subsequent to the act(s), professional misconduct, or crime(s) under consideration as grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation which also could be considered as grounds for denial under Section 480 of the Business and Professions Code.;

(3) The time that has elapsed since commission of the act(s), professional misconduct, or crime(s) referred to in subdivision (1) or (2)-;

(4) The extent to which Whether the applicant, licensee, or registrant has complied with any terms of parole, probation, restitution, or any other sanctions lawfully imposed against the applicant., licensee, or registrant; and

(5) Evidence, if any, of rehabilitation submitted by the applicant, licensee, or registrant.

(b) When considering the suspension or revocation of a license or a registration on the grounds that the licensee or registrant has been convicted of a crime, the bureau, in evaluating the rehabilitation of such person, will consider the following criteria:

(1) Nature and severity of the act(s) or offense(s).

(2) Total criminal record.

(3) The time that has elapsed since commission of the act(s) or offense(s).

(4) Whether the licensee or registrant has complied with any terms of parole, probation, restitution, or any other sanctions lawfully imposed against the licensee or registrant.

(5) If applicable, evidence of expungement proceedings pursuant to Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code.

(6) Evidence, if any, of rehabilitation submitted by the licensee or registrant.

(c) When considering a petition for reinstatement of a license or a registration, the  $b\underline{B}$ ureau shall evaluate evidence of rehabilitation submitted by the petitioner, considering those criteria specified in subsection (b).

§ 3395.2. <u>Substantial Relationship</u> Criteria for Denial, Suspension, or Revocation of a Registration.

- (a) For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a license or registration pursuant to Section 141, Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475), subdivision (b) of Section 9884.22, subdivision (f) of Section 9889.2, or subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 9889.3 of the Business and Professions Code, aA crime, professional misconduct, or act shall be considered to be substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a licensee or registrant if, to a substantial degree, it shows that the registrant is presently or potentially unfit to perform the functions authorized by the <u>evidences present or potential unfitness</u> of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by the license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare. Such crimes or acts shall include, but not be limited to, any violation of the provisions of Article 3 of Chapter 20.3 of Division 3 of the Business and Professions Code.
- (b) In making the substantial relationship determination required under subdivision
  - (a) for a crime, the Bureau shall consider all of the following criteria:
    - (1) The nature and gravity of the offense.
    - (2) The number of years elapsed since the date of the offense.
    - (3) The nature and duties of a licensee or registrant.
